Meeting March 3 2023

Introduction & Announcements

Recording on Zoom started at 7:30 pm. Keith Schmidt introduced himself as our current Chapter Vice President at 7:31 pm. He was presiding from our in-person meeting site at the North Shore Congregational Church in Fox Point. The office of Chapter President has been vacant since the 2023 election at the annual business meeting on Friday, February 3, 2023.

Keith said that we really need a Chapter President to preside at our meetings and provide leadership. There is only one hard rule that limits eligibility to serve. Officers and directors have to be dues-paying members of both the Wisconsin Chapter and NRHS National. The President does not have to be perfect / know everything. He does not have to do everything by himself. There are other members ready to help with Zoom and other technology support—and with other tasks as well.

We are looking for volunteers for the new set-up committee for the church meeting room before the meetings. They will also clean up and close up afterwards. Having a committee will avoid one person having to commit to working every month. We are looking for someone to take over the snack and beverage table at the back of the room.

There will be another on-line Zoom-only railroad Gab Fest on Friday, March 10. An e-mail notice will be sent out to members shortly. Our next meeting will be on Friday, April 14, 2023. That is a change from our normal first-Friday schedule. It is the second Friday in April. April 7 is Good Friday. The church will be holding worship services on April 7. We are looking for a presenter for April 14.

Keith reminded us that all of our meetings, presentations, slide shows, other events, and internet / web presence are supported by our membership. If you see value in any of that, please join us. Annual Wisconsin Chapter dues remain at \$20.00 per person. There has been no increase with the recent bout of inflation. There are three ways to join (or renew). The

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first is cash payment while attending a Chapter meeting.in person. The second is on-line payment via our website at nrhswis.org. It includes a \$1.00 fee for PayPal processing costs. The third is to send a check to Wisconsin Chapter NRHS, P. O. Box 070758, Milwaukee, WI 53207. Dues payments support Chapter activities and publications. Your support is much appreciated.

Keith counted 10 people in the physical meeting room at the church. There were then 35 devices connected to the Zoom meeting room.

Keith turned the podium over to membership committee chair Mike Yuhas. Mike re-iterated the above suggestion that those finding value in our meetings, events, and content should consider joining. Our e-mail provider may soon start limiting the number of announcements that we can broadcast. Members will have priority. Non-members risk not receiving timely notice of Chapter meetings, slide shows and other events. We still have a few members who have not yet renewed for 2023. He will not mention any names. They know who they are. They risk being excluded from our e-mail list. Presentation

Mike Yuhas introduced our presenter Richard Koenig at 7:39 pm. Mr. Koenig grew up in Bloomington, Indiana. He started taking train pictures there as a teen ager. He studied photography at the Pratt Institute. He worked as a professional photographer in New York City. He returned to Indiana University at Bloomington for graduate studies. He is currently a Professor of Art at Kalamazoo College in Kalamazoo, Michigan. He recently returned to railroad photography with a focus on the first transcontinental railroad—prior to its 2019 sesquicentennial. Some of those photos have been published in the NRHS Bulletin and Railroad Heritage.

The time focus of tonight's presentation was from about 1975 until Mr. Koenig left Bloomington in 1981. Most of that time was before the Staggers deregulation act that led to major changes. The number of Class I railroads in the United States dropped from 33 in 1975 to 7 in 2023. We started with the two railroads that cross at Bloomington and then moved outward. Part One consisted of 30 images of the NE-SW Illinois Central secondary line from Effingham, Illinois, to Indianapolis, Indiana. The Indianapolis Southern built that line in 1906. They sold it to the Illinois Central in 1911. It was known as the "High-Dry Line" for its superior engineering, with a number of high fills and bridges. The Illinois Central became the Illinois Central Gulf (following its merger with the Gulf, Mobile & Ohio) in 1972 (before our time frame started). The subject Indianapolis line became the main line of the Indiana Railroad in 1986. Part Two consisted of 49 images of the north-south former Monon line. The New Albany & Salem built the first track in 1853. It became part of the Louisville, New Albany & Chicago in 1859. That company changed its name to the Chicago, Indianapolis, & Louisville (informally known as the Monon) in 1897. The Louisville & Nashville took over the Monon in 1971. The subject line was part of L&N during the time frame of our presentation. L&N became part of Seaboard System in 1982. They became part of CSX in 1986. Most of the line around Bloomington was abandoned in 1993. The Indiana Railroad used the Monon yard until 2006.

Part Three went further outward. We first went south to the former Chicago, Terre Haute & South Eastern (then part of the Milwaukee Road), former Ohio & Mississippi (then part of Baltimore & Ohio), and the Southern line across southern Indiana from Louisville, Kentucky to St. Louis, Missouri. Then we went north to the former New York Central and Pennsylvania (and other) lines around Indianapolis. We went west into Illinois. We finished with some images from the Chicago area and Wisconsin. The Wisconsin shots got as far north as the Green Bay & Western.

New Railroad Begins April 14th

Federal regulators today March 15 2023, gave the green light to the historic merger of Canadian Pacific and Kansas City Southern.

Their \$31.6 billion deal — thought to be the last merger between two Class I railroads — redraws the North American rail map by creating the first railroad linking Canada, the U.S., and Mexico.

The Surface Transportation Board, in its 212-page decision approving CP's acquisition of KCS, said the merger will increase railroad competition and help take trucks off the highway. The board's decision, reached on Monday, was not unanimous: Four members backed the merger, while board member Robert Primus voted against the combination.

The merger will become effective on April 14, although there was no word on when CP and KCS will begin to mesh their operations. CP said it is reviewing the board's decision and will announce its plans for the creation of Canadian Pacific Kansas City in the coming days.

CPKC will have its headquarters in Calgary, Alberta, and its U.S. headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

"This decision clearly recognizes the many benefits of this historic combination," CP CEO Keith Creel said in a statement. "As the STB found, it will stimulate new competition, create jobs, lead to new investment in our rail network, and drive economic growth. These benefits are unparalleled for our employees, rail customers, communities and the North American economy at a time when the supply chains of these three great nations have never needed it more."

Do You Know by Dave Nelson

L.B. Foster, an established name in railroad contracting, purchased the CXT Company, a major manufacturer of precast concrete products, in 1999. CXT was in the process of erecting a huge new plant in Grand Island, Nebraska, entirely devoted to supplying pre-stressed concrete ties to one customer: the Union Pacific. What made CXT such an attractive acquisition for Foster (although CXT's non-rail product line was and remains very profitable) is that the UP was poised to spend enormous sums in the early 2000s on their most important lines to replace wood ties with pre-stressed concrete ties.

Little could the Foster company have anticipated the financial disaster they were buying into.



One such tie replacement project was the former C&NW east/west double track main line across Illinois and Iowa to Council Bluffs, a crucial traffic artery. One track of the two was worked on first. Almost immediately, those new ties began to crack, split, crumble, and disintegrate. The UP abruptly



became a single track railroad on one of its most strategic routes. In 2011 the UP demanded that CXT make good on a a warranty claim for all ties made in Grand Island up to 2010. At the same time the UP terminated the purchase of any more ties made at the Grand Island plant, a plant which CXT didn't just close but abruptly dismantled, with a loss of 70 or more jobs. The warranty claim was financially significant enough to require public disclosure by Foster to the Securities and Exchange Commission. CXT resist-

ed the UP's claim, questioning how UP crews had installed those ties (concrete ties are not a drop-in replacement, and need different roadbed and track-laying practices than for wood ties). UP sued in 2015 and the litigation was settled in 2019 with millions of dollars in damages paid to the UP, but with UP's assurances that L.B. Foster/CXT would remain a supplier of concrete ties for the railroad.

I took these amazing photos in Rochelle, Dixon, and Nelson, IL showing just how badly the CXT ties failed. In some cases nothing was holding the rail in place for yard after yard of track.

In recent years they had been affectionately dubbed the "Berlin Bullet" by railroaders, patrons, and fans. Motor car No. 5900 is presently on trains 12 and 23, the Cannonball, between Milwaukee and Watertown....The Chapter roster lists twenty members

April 1963 - 60 Years Ago

Jim Scribbins reports that the Soo Line is taking delivery of its new Geeps, be on the lookout for them....The Milwaukee Road is repainting cabooses, with the number above the bay window and a herald below.

April 1968 - 55 Years Ago

The Milwaukee Road will operate a bi-level passenger extra on Saturday May 4 from Wisconsin Rapids to Wauwatosa and return. The 1200 passengers will visit the Milwaukee County Zoo....Ex-GTW No. 5629 will operate to South Bend and return on May 5....The two privately owned North Shore cars stored at Jones Island are scheduled to be moved to the WERHS storage site in Menomonee Falls soon.

April 1973 - 50 Years Ago

Famed designer Brooks Stevens, who designed the Hiawatha Skytop Lounge Observation cars, will be the speaker at the annual Chapter banquet on May 18....ICG's 1926-vintage electric suburban cars will be retired soon when 15 new double-deckers are delivered.

April 1978 - 45 Years Ago

The Royal Hudson No. 2860 is scheduled to be on display at Waukesha on Friday and Saturday, April 21 and 22....BN is studying whether to move the corporate headquarters from St. Paul to another state. BN employs more than 3,000 people in its St. Paul headquarters.

April 1983 - 40 Years Ago

Butler Railroad/Frontier Days will feature train rides on the C&NW powered by ex-C&NW steam locomotive No. 1385.The event, scheduled for June 4 and 5 is cosponsored by the Butler Lions Club, the Butler Area Chamber of Commerce, Wisconsin Chapter-NRHS, and the C&NW, Chapter member Jerry Hilton is serving as general chairman of Railroad Days.

April 1988 - 35 Years Ago

The Wisconsin Chapter annual banquet on May 6 will feature Ed Burkhardt, president of the new Wisconsin Central, as speaker.

April 1993 - 30 Years Ago

Plans are progressing for the 53rd Annual NRHS Convention in Chicago July 21 through 25. Four mainline steam engines are expected to be in attendance, N&W 611, UP 3985, ex-NKP 765 and 587...The first regular service double stack train on the Soo Line (ex-Milwaukee Road - now CP) was observed on March 6.

April 1998 - 25 Years Ago

Milwaukee-Watertown commuter rail service is set to begin on April 13 running via the CP. The trains will be extensions of the Chicago-Milwaukee Hiawatha service. The service will operate for 90 days during the reconstruction of I-94....WSOR announced a number of summer and fall passenger excursions utilizing their E-units and passenger cars....Ex NMRA. David is also a member of the Soo -Milwaukee Road No. 261 will power steam excursions out of Green Bay on July 4 and 5 April 2003 - 15 Years Ago

Friday Evening June 20th a Dinner Train will run from Milwaukee to Sturtevant, Sat and Sun June 21st and 22nd trips from Milwaukee to New Lisbon.WI will run, #261 will head back to Minneapolis, MN on Tuesday June 24th. Amtrak will celebrate what is being called National Train Day on May 10th in four cities including Chica-go and Los Angeles. This will be the culmination of six weeks of events.

April 2013 - 10 Years Ago

It was announced the long time chapter member Bob Bullerman has passed away on Feb 23, 2013. Jeff Plale Wisconsin Railroad Commissioner is the speaker for the annual chapter banquet. It was announced that money was being raised to have N&W #611 be restored to operating condition. This was a big announcement. (Note - #611 was restored and is running excursions).
